# Road Safety Week is an annual campaign, organised by Brake, the road safety charity.

Every year, thousands of communities, schools and companies get involved to shout out for road safety where they live and work.

### Why is Road Safety Week important?

- Five people die on UK roads every day.
- Every day, six children are killed or seriously injured on UK roads.
- Last year, 1,671 people died on UK roads. Another 28,804 suffered serious, life-changing injuries.\*

- Remember people killed or injured on UK roads
- Raise awareness of road safety.
- Call on the Government for a road safety strategy based on the solutions we know will prevent road death and injury.
- Raise funds to help Brake care for road victims and campaign for safe roads for all.

## What is a safe vehicle?

Safe vehicles are designed to prevent road crashes and protect people inside and outside the vehicle if a crash does happen



#### Safe vehicles...



**Prevent crashes** - Automated driver assistance systems keep vehicles in the right lane and below speed limits, detect hazards and brake in an emergency.



**Are roadworthy** - Vehicles are maintained to the highest standards and drivers carry out checks before every journey.



Protect people inside and outside the vehicle -Seatbelts, airbags and 'forgiving' vehicle parts protect people inside and outside the vehicle in a crash. Vehicles must pass stringent crash tests.



**Record crashes** - Event data recorders record what happens in a crash and notify emergency services immediately.



Manage driver safety - Vehicle technology detects unsafe driving behaviour (e.g. due to tiredness) and informs authorities.

Safe vehicles are an important part of the safe systems approach to road safety - a shared approach to prevent death and serious injury from road crashes.

Let's make every journey we make as safe as possible, whoever we are and however we travel.

## Review your policies and procedures to ensure you are buying or leasing the safest vehicles you can

Road Safety Week is a great time to **review** your policies and procedures to ensure you are buying, hiring or leasing the safest vehicles vou can afford, with advanced technology to help prevent crashes, and prevent death or serious injury if a crash occurs. As a responsible organisation that puts safety first, you should also ensure that all vehicles driven by your employees,

including employees' own vehicles, conform to the same high standards for safety, and are maintained to high standards. Drivers should be supported to carry out regular inspections before every journey, and your policies should clearly state when vehicles will end their life of service.

### Help drivers understand the safety benefits of advanced driver assistance features in their vehicles

Road Safety Week is a great opportunity to educate your drivers about the safety benefits of vehicle safety technology, to promote acceptance and use. Advanced driver assistance systems, with safety features such as advanced emergency braking, intelligent speed assistance and attention warning in case of driver **drowsiness** are now widely available in most new vehicles and play a significant role in improving road safety, helping to prevent

crashes and protect drivers and their passengers, as well as other road users such as pedestrians and cyclists.

Although this technology is widely accepted as having great potential to prevent crashes and reduce the likelihood of death and injury if a collision does occur, new Brake research shows that many people switch off the safety features in their cars, either because they find it annoying or because they don't understand how it will make them safer.\*

Share our factsheets and infographics to help people understand what we mean when we talk about safe vehicles and how the latest vehicle safety technology can make us all safer - but only if we keep features such as intelligent speed assistance switched on when we get in our cars!

# Support Brake's campaign for all new vehicles to have life-saving technology fitted as standard

During Road Safety Week 2025 we are calling on Government to make life-saving vehicle safety technology mandatory for all new vehicles in the UK, in line with the General Safety Regulations that have now been introduced in Europe.

In July 2022, under the Vehicle General Safety Regulation, a number of important vehicle safety features became mandatory for all new vehicles in the EU, including advanced emergency braking, intelligent speed assistance and attention warning in case of driver drowsiness.

These safety features can play a significant role in improving road safety, helping to prevent crashes and protect drivers and their passengers, as well as other road users such as pedestrians and cyclists. The Vehicle General Safety

Regulation also includes key measures that enhance vehicle crash performance and will significantly improve the protection of women and the elderly in the event of a collision providing fairer and more equitable transport. Road safety experts have estimated that adopting the Vehicle General Safety Regulation in Britain could prevent more than 1,700 deaths and 15,000 serious injuries over 16 years, saving up to £7 billion in health costs if the full package of measures were to be fully implemented.

During Road Safety Week, we will run a high-profile media campaign across national and local media.

#### We will:

- Highlight the true extent of road crashes by revealing new research and analysis of government road casualty data, and revealing the stories behind the numbers.
- Raise awareness of the proven benefits of advanced driver assistance features such as intelligent speed assistance, advanced emergency braking and driver-drowsiness-detection systems.
- Host an event for MPs in Westminster to engage them with our call for the Vehicle General Safety Regulation to be adopted into the road safety strategy.



### How your fundraising helps

£5 Would provide guidance to someone who has been seriously injured in a road crash, offering vital advice and support.

£25 Would fund a triage call, the first step in getting families the help they need from Brake's National Road Victim Service after a road death or serious injury.

£60 Would cover the cost of a home visit from one of our specialist bereavement caseworkers, giving face-to-face support to a family affected by a road crash.

£115 Would support a road victim for one day, offering crucial emotional and practical support during their most vulnerable moments

£833 Would provide dedicated support for one road victim over three months. helping families navigate the aftermath of a crash.











# Remembering road victims

Road Safety Week is a special time to host or attend a memorial event in memory of a loved one who has died in a road crash.

A memorial event can be as big or small as you choose. It could be a public event for others to join, or a private occasion for close family and friends.

Here are a few ideas of how this can happen.

#### With friends and family

It could be as simple as making time to be together to mark the occasion. Talk about a loved one over a beer in the pub, get out for a walk or invite people over.

### Places of worship

Look out for local memorial events taking place at places of worship near you during the week, or get in touch with faith leaders if you'd like them to remember your loved one. It could be a moment's silence at the start of a service, or a dedicated service for road victims.

#### At work

You could hold a minute's silence in memory of a colleague who has died, or for all road victims. You could also gather for a coffee morning, share photos and memories. Signing a memory book also offers people a way to remember.

#### Social and community groups

A short period of time for reflection at the beginning of a meeting is a great way to pay respects, or you can host a special event.

For example, a choir group might like to sing a favourite song.

#### Sports clubs

Ask your local sports club to hold a minute's silence at the start of a game or match, or display messages on screens around the venue during half time. Another example would be to host a charity game or match in memory of a much-loved member of your team or supporter community.

#### At home

Light a candle in memory of your loved one on World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims. You could share a photo on social media using #WDoR.















#### **Donations in memory**

If you are hosting a memorial event, please consider collecting donations to Brake in memory of your loved one. We can help you with donation buckets and collection envelopes, or help you set up an online fundraiser or tribute page on the Internet where you can remember and share a loved one's stories, pictures and things that made them special to help keep their memory alive.

All money raised through donations will help fund Brake's vital work supporting road victim families and campaigning to end road death and harm.


